Bill #	HB17-1053
Title	Warrant Or Order For Electronic Communications
H-Spon	L. Landgraf
S-Spon	
Summary	<p>This bill provides that a governmental entity must have a valid search warrant or court order to require an electronic communication service to disclose the contents of an electronic communication. The bill provides an exception if the time required to obtain the warrant or order would result in a risk of death or substantial bodily injury or if certain persons consent to the release of the communication.</p> <p>The bill also requires that the governmental entity give the customer notice of the search warrant and the disclosure unless the court orders that the notice need not be given.</p> <p>Any evidence obtained without the warrant or order cannot be introduced as evidence and immunity is provided to the electronic communication service for complying with or objecting to a search warrant.</p> <p>Nothing in the bill changes the application of exceptions available to investigators, law enforcement officials, or district attorneys pursuant to existing law.</p>

Title	Drone Use By Public Safety Agencies

Summary	<p>The bill requires the center of excellence (center) within the division of fire prevention and control within the department of public safety (department) to conduct a study concerning the integration of unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) within state and local government operations that relate to public safety.</p> <p>The bill also creates an UAS pilot program (pilot program) to integrate UAS within state and local government operations that relate to public safety.</p>

Title	Reporting and Limiting Civil Forfeiture

Summary	<p>The bill requires the Department of Public Safety to establish and maintain a website containing specified information on each criminal forfeiture involving property and specified information on how each governmental agency that received proceeds from forfeitures used those proceeds.</p> <p>The bill requires each seizing agency to update the information posted on the division's website and the seizing agency must pay a fee to update the website. Failure to update the website can result in a fine of \$10,000 and the agency becoming ineligible to receive forfeited property or proceeds.</p> <p>The bill prohibits a seizing agency from transferring or referring seized property to a federal governmental agency for forfeiture litigation unless the property includes currency in excess of \$100,000. Instead, the seizing agency must refer seized property to the appropriate state, district, county, or municipal prosecuting authority.</p> <p>Currently, seizing agencies report information about forfeiture to DOLA. That information is subject to CORA but is not on a public website. Additionally, most prosecution for civil forfeiture is done by the federal government through the Equitable Sharing Program</p>

Mental Health Hold Task Force Budget Request

Strengthening Community Services: \$3,580,318 Marijuana Tax Cash Funds (Budget Amendment-06)

Statewide Training: \$57,500 MTCF

- The Department recommends development of a statewide training capacity by procuring a contractor or multiple contractors to work with the Department.
- The Department will convene a group of stakeholders to include individuals with lived experience, crisis response contractors, hospital emergency personnel and first responders to review training materials.
- Oversight for the development of the training curriculum will be provided by the Mental Health Advisory Board for Services, Standards and Regulations.

Regional Coordination Between Hospitals, Law Enforcement, and Crisis Response System: \$2,011,481 MTCF

- The Department proposes to implement a process where regions would be asked to identify the local challenges and develop a plan.
- Regional planning processes would include, at a minimum, local law enforcement, hospitals, BHOs, regional crisis contractors, CMHCs, SUD providers, County human and social services, individuals with lived experience.
- The resulting plan would specify the problems, objectives and outcomes to be addressed and the funds to be used to address each problem. Fund would be provided to fill the gaps.

Assessment of Need and Capacity of the Crisis Response System: \$50,000 MTCF

- To better understand the gap between the existing Crisis Response System and the State, the Department proposes to procure a study that examines population and need data related to behavioral health crises.
- The assessment will determine if the current Crisis Response System service capacity in each region and on a statewide basis is effectively meeting behavioral health crisis response needs.
- This information will help CDHS, HCPF, CDPHE in identifying where existing resources should be allocated.

Crisis Stabilization Beds and Walk-in Centers in Western Colorado: \$976,255 MTCF

- The Department Proposes to solicit requests for proposals from the western portion of Colorado to establish additional crisis stabilization capacity.
- The Department would require prospective bidders to assess community needs and to determine the facility and geographic location that will best serve the Western Slope.

Investigation of issues and solutions related to the transportation of individuals on mental health holds: \$485,082 MTCF

- The Department proposes procuring an independent contractor or contractors to provide safe, secure transportation of individuals from jails, EDs, or other community locations to 27-65 designated mental health facilities.
- The estimate of \$485,082 for transportation includes two transportation pilot teams in total, one team covering two regions, with two 8 hour shifts covering sixteen hours a day, seven-days-a-week.

Support Community-Based Criminal Justice Diversion Programs, Integrated Behavioral Health and Crisis System Coordination: \$6,064,700 Marijuana Tax Cash Funds (BA-07)**Criminal Justice Diversion Programs: \$5.3 million MTCF**

- A portion of the funds will support the implementation of evidence-based, pre-booking criminal justice diversion programs, such as co-responder models and Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD).
- The Department would fund between 16 and 26 contracts which would include a combination of support to expand existing programs and new pilot programs: \$2,470,000 for pilot programs (four LEAD Pilot programs) and \$2,900,000 for other law enforcement-behavioral health partnership models.
- In order to evaluate the effectiveness of the programs, \$170,000 is requested in year 1 to procure and evaluation of the projects funded.

Crisis Contractor Community Coordinators: \$440,000 MTCF

- The Department requests \$440,000 to support approx.. 4.0 contracted FTE statewide to serve as Justice Liaisons/Community Coordinators.
