Vulnerable populations and older adults continue to Stay at Home



Supporting and protecting those most at risk continues to be critical

****If disease transmission significantly increases, take steps back****

THREE LEVELS



STAY AT HOME

Wide scale closures, except for critical functions, to reduce hospitalizations and deaths

Gatherings prohibited



SAFER AT HOME

Partial reopening, around 25%-50% with capacity caps, to give public health and health care systems ability to scale their testing, tracing and treatment capabilities.

Small gatherings are okay, but large gatherings are prohibited



PROTECT OUR NEIGHBORS

Expanded reopening, around 50% without caps, as local outbreaks are managed by strong local systems.

Larger gatherings are okay, but mass gatherings are prohibited until there is a treatment or vaccine.

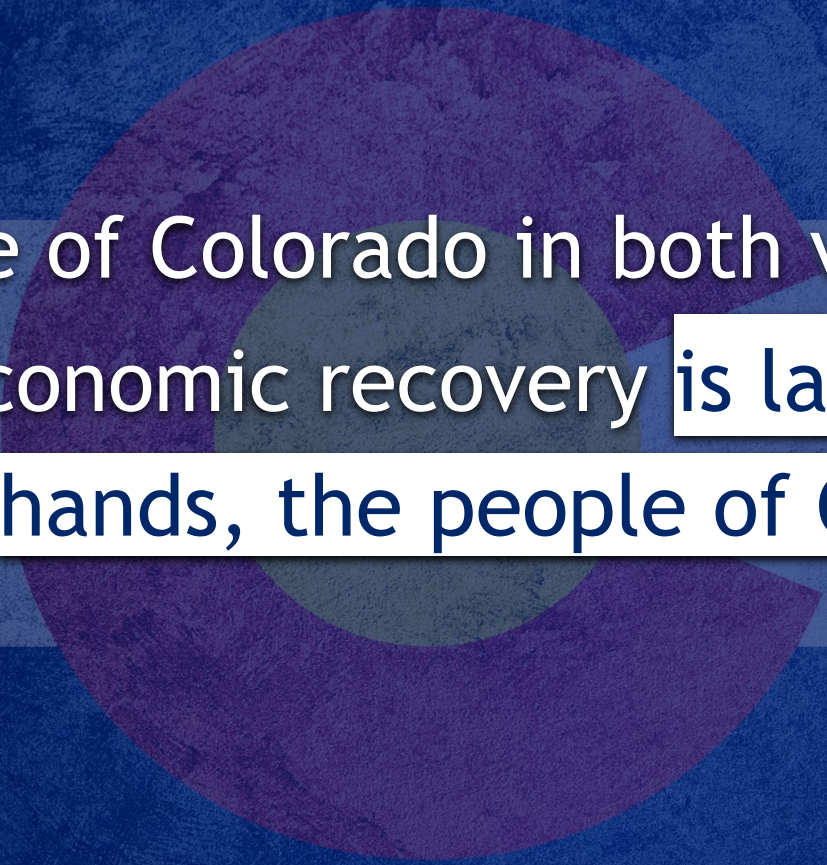

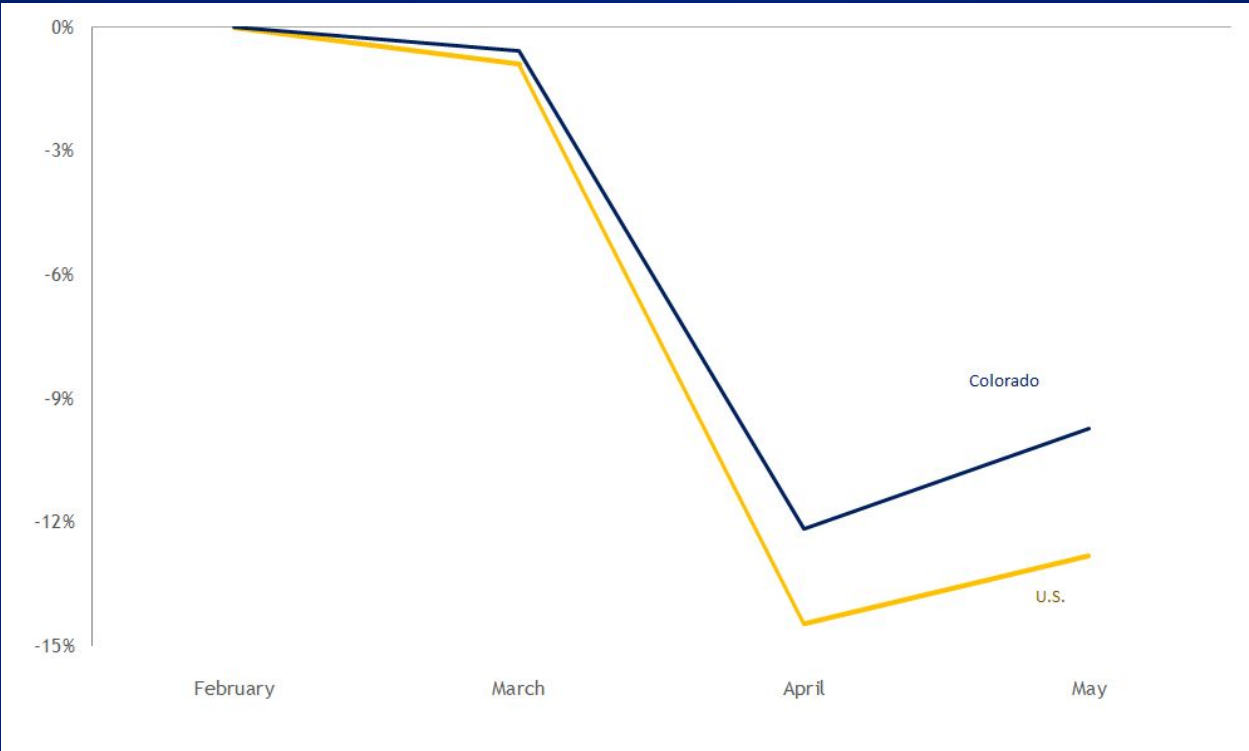

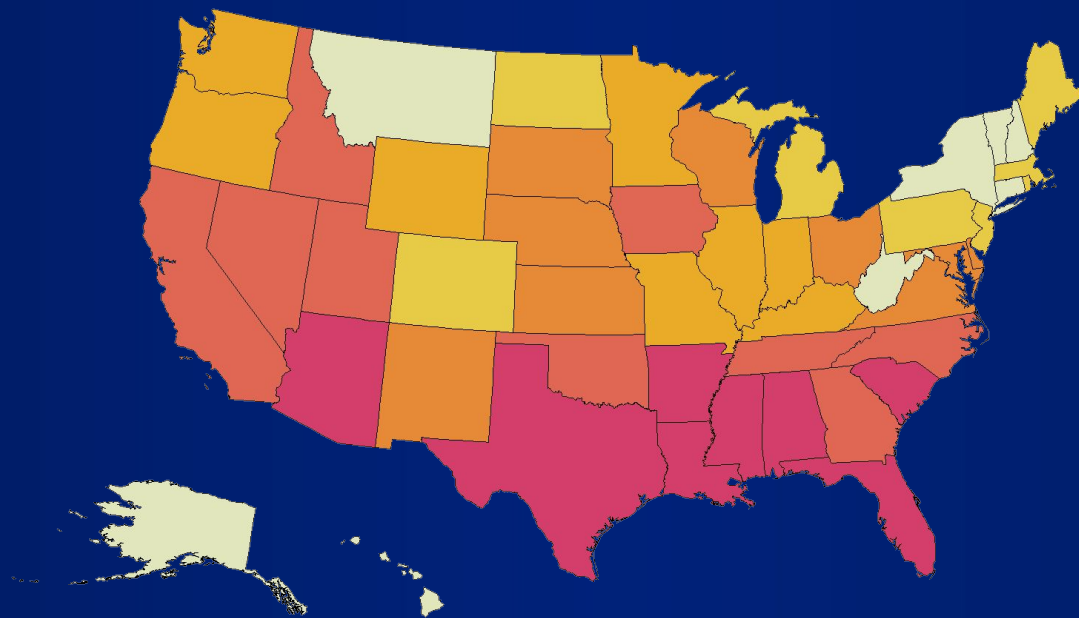


The fate of Colorado in both virus suppression

COLORADO COMPARED TO NEIGHBORING STATES

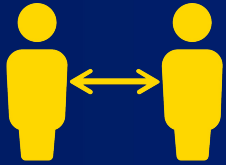


Incidence Rate per 100,000 in the Last 7 Days

PROTECT OUR NEIGHBORS

- 1.) Low virus prevalence
- 2.) Health care capacity to handle a surge
- 3.) Strong public health capacity to contain outbreaks and surges locally, including the ability to test, track, and trace.

Strong public health systems plus
additional healthcare capacity **are**
the key to re-opening the economy

Our ongoing economic success **is tied** to how well we control this virus -- especially at the local level.

PUBLIC HEALTH SYSTEMS & GETTING STRONGER

- **Scaling testing capacity**
 - State lab increased by 10x
 - 50 community testing sites
 - Building supply chain and stockpiles for for over 5,000 test a day currently, and more moving into the fall
- **PPE**
 - Nearly 2.5 million N95 and surgical masks have been distributed to locals -- and we now have a backup supply for Fall in case supply chains are interrupted again
- **Health care surge capacity**
 - Nationally recognized hospital coordination
 - Field hospitals to aid in a surge, if needed
- **Contact Tracing**
 - On track to onboard 1,000 new COVID response workforce statewide by the end of the summer

Protect Our Neighbors is a deliberate approach that empowers local governments, public health agencies, and partners to meet the needs of their communities

Protect Our Neighbors isn't just words. It means **we all**
accept personal responsibility for the things we can do
every day to keep ourselves and others healthy.

QUALIFYING FOR PROTECT OUR NEIGHBORS

- 1.) Qualify
- 2.) Mitigation plan

QUALIFYING FOR PROTECT OUR NEIGHBORS

1.) Qualify

- Sufficient hospital bed capacity
- Sufficient PPE supply
- Stable or declining cases of COVID-19 hospitalizations
- Fewer new COVID-19 cases
- Sufficient testing capacity
- The ability to implement case investigation and contact tracing protocols
- Documented surge capacity plans for case investigation and contact tracing
- And strategies to offer testing to close contacts of outbreak-associated cases

***The exact numbers to meet metrics will be different for each county, based on population.

2.) Mitigation plan

- Actions that will be taken if they fall out of compliance with metrics
- How counties will promote public compliance with the guidelines;
- How counties will increase mask wearing in public settings; and
- How they will increase influenza vaccine uptake as we approach flu season, to ensure we don't lose health care system capacity needed for COVID-19.

***These plans must be approved by local elected leaders including county commissioners and mayors, the hospitals that serve the county, law enforcement, emergency management, the local public health director, and if applicable, tribes.



The state is investing \$346 million in state and local capacity, with \$75 million going directly from the state to Local Public Health Agencies

PROTECT OUR NEIGHBORS GRANT PROGRAM

Protect Our Neighbors Planning Grants are designed to provide resources to local public health agencies to:

- Engage their communities to assess their containment and infrastructure needs
- Understand the experiences and needs of communities impacted by and at increased risk of COVID-19
- Develop plans to build the infrastructure they need to be successful in Protect Our Neighbor.

Local public health agencies may apply for up to \$50,000 in July.

PROTECT OUR NEIGHBORS GRANT PROGRAM

Infrastructure Strengthening Grants are for local public health agencies to fund investments in the public health and health care infrastructure to ensure success in Protect Our Neighbor.

These include activities like:

- Community Resource Coordination,
- Communication strategies
- Funding for community-based partners and cultural brokers
- Enhanced prevention and containment efforts.

These grants will have a maximum award of \$300,000 and require a local match.
